Our History

- The Diaper Bank movement began in 1994 when a small consulting firm decided to give back to their local community during the holiday season. Resolve Inc., located in Tucson, Arizona began their philanthropic endeavor by collecting diapers for a local crisis nursery
- In 2003 the Community Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona became a free standing charitable organization, becoming the nation's first Diaper Bank. In 2004, the New Haven Diaper Bank opened its doors using the model established in Southern Arizona. There are now more than 250 diaper banks across the country today.
- Just as it did at its inception, the Diaper Bank provides diapers to those under the poverty line where no public assistance exists. In 2013, the Diaper Bank distributed more than 742,000 diapers and incontinence supply items to more than 15,000 babies, toddlers, disabled youth and adults and senior citizens in 10 Southern Arizona Counties.
- In the coming years the Diaper Bank of Southern Arizona plans to meet the local need 100 percent and needs your help to do so.

What is Diaper Need?

- The Diaper Bank receives requests for more than 1.5 million diapers annually but due to its limited financial resources, is only able to collect and distribute 43 percent of those requests.
- Regardless of age or size, 6-10 diapers are needed daily (around \$100 per month).
- Public assistance is limited. Food assistance programs such as food stamps and WIC focus solely on food and nutrition, and therefore do not cover diapers.
- 1 in 3 American moms struggle with diaper needs. They often cut back on food, utilities and other necessities to provide diapers for their babies.
- 1 in 3 babies is born into poverty in Pima County.
- 25 percent of diapers collected and distributed by the Diaper Bank are for adult incontinence needs.
